On Surkey, April 7, 1958 at 9:4544, Capt. R. A. Cochran gave us a list of names and addresses that were supposed to have been in Jin's Grill, 418 5, Pain at approximately 6PH, April 4, 1968. He said to interview each one and get an oral or written statement.

On Sunday, April 7, 1968 at 10:1524 we went to where 1972 S. Fain was supposed to be, but found it to be a ted number. This number was given by George Harding, PM, 51.

On Surday, April 7, 1963 at 19:30AM we went to 418 3. Fain street, Jin's grill where we found the owner, Loyd Joses, FM, 41, residence 2176 James Ed., phone 358-6650, business phone 526-9910. In talking with Fr. Joses he stated that he had been questioned many times by the City police and the FMI, but was willing to cooperate and do whatever he could to assist us. We asked that he start in the beginning of his activities and he stated that he opens up every morning around 5:50AM and remains at 418 3. Hain street until around 10AM when he leaves and goes to 153 3. Calhoun, the check off cafe, which also belongs to him. He stays there until the moon hour rush is over, which is around 1PM and goes home and rests puntil around 3:30PM.

On April 4, 1968 be arrived at 418 S. Fain street approximately 3:50FM and he attempted to park in this usual place, which is directly in front of 418 3. Pain, but on this particulary date he was unable to do so as there was a white Firstang with out of state plates very class in apparance, parked in his parking place. He recalled it distinctly, because it upset him and he cursed under his breath, because someone did have his parking place. He said the license plates on this limitary were light in color, but he did not know the state. He said his first impression was that they were Mississippi license plates. He stated that he went on into the restaurant and nothing unusual occurred until around 6PM. He said he was standing at the cash register, which is in the front end of the building, when he heard a loud noise, which sounded like it care from the rear of the building or the kitchen. He left the sesh register and walked back to the kitchen and as he got to the last booth he storred and asked Harold Parker, 19, 48 if he had hoard the noise in the kitchen and Parker told him he had. He said he walked to the back room and looked around and did not see anything that had fallen and returned back towards the front of the restament, but before he got to the cash register he was stopped by Jesse Jackson, who was sitting at the har and serived him a glass of beer and then walked on up to the cash register. It was at this time that he noticed the Histang was gone, in fact it was the first time that he had looked out to check on the Mistang since he arrived at 3:50PH. A

About this time a State Highway patrolican opened the door to the restaurant with his pistol in his hand and ordered him to lock the doors and not to let anyone enter or leave. He said his first impression was the Regross were rioting again and did not associate the noise he had heard previously with the Righway patrolican or the rioting. He said that shortly after the Righway patrolican came in he saw a lot of policican in front of his cafe and a short time after that approximately 25 minutes from the time the trooper first ordered him to lock the door the same trooper came back in with other police officers and stated that Fertin Luther King had been shot. The customers were given tickets from the order books or checks and told to write down their names, achieves and places of employment. After each one did this the officers questioned each customer as well as himself. At around 9PH he was instructed to open the door and when he did nost of his customers went home, but there were a few who resided until he closed around 10:15PH.

He stated that at no time did he recall seeing anyone in or about the Hustang parked out in the front.

After receiving this information from Mr. Josens and finding out fromhim that he had not given a written statement pertaining to the above he was brought to the Homicide office by pus and at 11:55AH, April 7, 1968 he did give a written statement pertaining to the above.

In his written statement it was brought out that he knew the rajority of the run that was listed on the piece of paper given to us by Capt. Cochran and he stated that nost of them worked for Taylos Paper Co. which is nearby. Three of them works for M. E. Carter & Co. and that they were regular customers of his, but that he did not know anything about them personal.

He fairther stated that David H. Wood, He, who was also on this list told him after the excitement was over that when he first came to the case, time unknown, he had backed into a parking place directly in front of a white himtens, that was parked in front of the case and whom he got out of his car he walked between the History and the rear of his car and that he had noticed that the History did not have a license plate onthe front, nor did it have a city tag or inspection tag. He suither told him that the car had black walled tires.

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We left Headquarters and took Mr. Journs back to 413 5. Wain and got in service at 1:25PM,

We took the list given us by Capt. Cochren and routed them rather than skip about and at 1:40FH, April 7, 1968 we went to 1066 Poplar, Apr. 3 to attempt to locate James A. Walker, Jr. To one was at home.

At 1:54PH we went to 1054 Heda to attempt to locate Eurold Farker, Md, 48 and found no one at home.

At 3:127H we wont to 935 Parkinson to talk with Parry Tubbs and Store Copples and found no one at home.

At 3:16FH we went to 1592 S. Highland to interview Billy Pay Hoard, FM and found no one at home.

At 3:279H we went to3972 Now Willow Rd. to talk with Kenneth W. Foster and found no one at home.

At 3:45TH we want to 3639 Aldendale Ed. the home of Frenklin Esy and was admitted by Frs. Bay and Franklin. There was another Ed sitting there with them, that they introduced as Steve Cupplies, who was also on our list to check and who lives at 935 Farkhaven. In interviewing Steve Cupplies, Hi, 21,327-7836, employed at Taylor Faper Co. 420 S. Front street he stated Steve Cupplies, Hi, 21,327-7836, employed at Taylor Faper Co. 420 S. Front street he stated that he parked on the west side of Pain street directly across from Jin's grill at 481 S. Fain street. As he crossed Pain street he noticed a white Pastang parked in front of Jin's Fail, but he coul not recall if he walked in front or behind the finstang to get in the grill. His stated that he recalled that he was thinking the car, Pastang, was dirty, as he had to brush against the front or back of it to get past and looked to see if hegot any dirt on his clothing. He didn't recall anything other than this about the Pastang. He further stated that he arrived at Jin's grill around 5:15 to \$:30FM. He played the pin ball rachine with several other Taylor Paper co. employees, but did not see nor hear anything unread until the officer care into the front door with his pistol in his hand and ordered the owner to look the door and to not let anyone leave or enter. He was upuble to add anything to the above to assist in our investigation.

We then interviewed // Frenklin Pay, Hi, 21, phone 323-9725. He stated that he did not see or hear anything and could not give us any information at all as he was not paying attention to what was going on until after the police officer came in and ordered the owner of Jin's grill to lock the door.

We then systemattically meturned to 3972 New Willow rold, 1592 S. Highland, 1054 Meda, 1066 Poplar, Apt. 3 and still no one was at home.

As Hr. David H. Wood had agreed to meet us in the Homicide office between 3 and AHI for the purpose of giving a written statement we returned to Headquarters and found that he had not called or come to the office and he was again contacted by phone, but was unable to get any one to answer.

is must of the ones we wanted to talk to are employed at Taylor Paper Co. 129 S. Front or M. E. Carter & Co. it may be possible to talk with all of them at one time on Homey, April 8, 1968.
